Helping Students Achieve

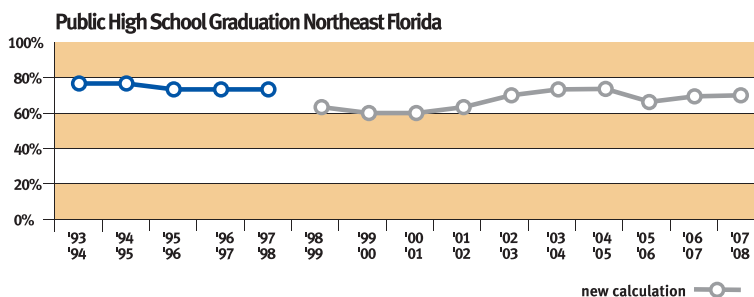
ISSUE: In Duval county, 34% of 9th graders do not graduate high school. A study** published by the Florida Times-Union found that more than 60 percent of accused murderers did not finish high school and one out of seven failed to reach 9th grade.

**Educational data on 178 of 265 persons accused of murder from June 2003 through June 2006

SOLUTION: Led by United Way, Full Service Schools of Jacksonville brings together community resources, neighbors and schools to promote the health and well-being of students, their families, and neighborhood residents. The goal of the collaboration is to deliver to the classroom healthy, motivated, and well-behaved students.

In addition, United Way convened community members to study the issues associated with dropping out of school. The result of their study was the development of a multi-tiered strategy to address the complex problem of dropping out of school — Achievers For Life was implemented in Arlington in October 2007 and expanded to Northwestern and Matthew Gilbert middle schools during the 2008-09 school year.

IMPACT: More than 29,000 people were served through Full Service Schools last year. On average, students served by Full Service Schools committed 50% fewer serious offenses at school during the last school quarter compared to the time before they received services. 339 families were served through Achievers For Life last year. Students participating from the beginning of the year increased their GPAs from 2.1 to 2.4 on average.
